Reading.

St Luke 10 v 25 – 37 (N.I.V. Version) <u>Luke 10:25-37 NIV - The Parable of the Good Samaritan - On - Bible Gateway</u>

Reflection

This is probably the most famous of Jesus' parables, known from childhood.

The expert in the Scriptures asks the question 'Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He was obviously wanting to see how Jesus would answer him. As so often Jesus in his answer turned the question back onto the enquirer who quotes the Scripture 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your strength and with all your mind', and 'Love your neighbour as yourself'. Jesus says these are the requirements, so go and do this.

The Lawyer wanted more clarification, and this is where Jesus expands the answer with the parable. Now he's on dangerous ground because Jesus turns the question inside out and skewers the lawyer's self-serving hypocrisy.

Having travelled on the road from Jerusalem to Jericho I can assure you it could be a likely place for an incident such as this to happen. The journey is about 17 miles, having a descent from Jerusalem at approximately 2,500 ft above sea level to Jericho that is 800ft below sea level. It passes through rocky, desert countryside providing places where robbers could waylay defenceless travellers. This would give credence to Jesus' parable. We read the robbers stripped him of his clothes and left him half-dead at the side of the road.

First, we have the priest coming by – he didn't even go near the man – he passed by on the other side – he didn't want any contact with the man. Then we have the Levite, (a Levite was the priest's lay associate) – again someone you would expect to give help – again he too passed by on the other side. Thirdly we have a Samaritan – there was open hostility between Jews and Samaritans – the Jews considered the Samaritans as half-breeds, both physically and spiritually. But he was the person who did everything he could for the injured man – the unexpected carer who went the 'extra mile'. (The money he left at the Inn was 2 days wages, but it would pay for 2 months stay in the Inn.)

The final answer had to come from the Lawyer, Jesus asks him to decide who was the man's neighbour – he replies, 'The one who had mercy on him.' – to which Jesus replies 'Go and do likewise.' The loathed Samaritan becomes a model of Law keeping for the pious lawyer – even though he would not have crossed the street to kick such a person!

This is telling us quite clearly that we should help anyone in need, regardless of who they are or what they've done, and we learn lessons in Christian living from the most unlikely sources. As we practise our Christian faith this parable gives us encouragement but also puts us under an obligation to have a practical and generous love for people, especially when they are in need.

May we not be like the Priest and Levite and walk by on the other side – but be like the Samaritan giving help.
