## Reflection

In the centre of Piccadilly Gardens, Manchester there used to be a homeless man who sat with his dog and would offer to pray with people as they went by. I never knew anything of his story — all I can recall is the dismay of some of the local Methodist congregation at the man's audacity at offering prayer in that way. From time to time someone would try to find out what denomination he was (after all you really have to have a denomination to pray!), at times they would try to move him on. It would have been ok, I suspected if Methodists had gone out offering prayer (though, of course they never did) but not just some 'random' man.

I always remember that incident when I read this part of Mark's gospel story. The disciples, you recall have just finished arguing about which of them is the greatest. Now it seems they notice someone healing who is not part of their group! Shock, horror! Now John comes to Jesus and says 'well, whatever the order of our importance, this guy is definitely nowhere in the pecking line'!

'He is not one of us!'

Jesus, as we might expect is having none of it, and responds 'whoever is not against us is for us' He tells John to leave the man be, and that if he is doing the work of the Kingdom then that is ok with him.

Of course, this is Mark's gospel – so there is a sense of urgency about the story, and certainly by this point in the tale as the tide starts to turn on Jesus in terms of his public ministry. Maybe Jesus is only too happy to take Kingdom work, no matter where or how it appears, even if that happens to be through the most unlikely people. He continues (if the two parts of this story actually belong together and were not joined at some point later to make a point) by saying to the established group that they are under no circumstances permitted to cause people who are carrying out Kingdom work, healing, teaching, to stumble.

If they are tempted to do so, things will not go well for them! And, in order to prevent them from doing that they may well have to consider chopping off a hand or a foot...seems extreme?

Well, perhaps so – but we are left in no doubt about what Jesus thinks of people who stand in the way of others expressing faith in daily life in their own way, and to the benefit of the wider community. Though Jesus is not really advocating actual amputation his point is very clear. Anything which stands in the way of authentic expression of faith, even from those who are not 'one of us' will have to go!

I wonder what that says to us in our own day, who are so often keen to keep the Church as our domain, and are quite clear about who is inside and outside of that domain? I wonder what it says to our beliefs within denominations that the only 'proper' way to do things is the way we do them? I wonder what it would look like to be open to the authentic expression of faith in community without us having to claim or legitimise such things by labelling them as 'church owned?'

I thought of a couple of examples.

- I was very privileged in my student placement days to belong to a Methodist Church in Whalley Range, where the largely West African congregation of the Windrush generation left a lasting impression upon me in a really positive way. They had a very definite culture not of 'come and see how we do things here, and then you can do those things in just the same way', but rather it was a culture of 'come and bring your own spiritual offering, come and join us in doing something for the community, and do it in your own way!' It produced a vibrant and outward looking church which was perceived within the wider community as somewhere you could come to explore your spirituality as somewhere which cared deeply about the needs of its neighbours far more than it ever did about 'raising money for the chapel'. I recall one evening in particular when they put a prayer tent in the high street at carnival time they made West African street food which they gave away to passers-by, and they invited people to decorate the external wall of the chapel with prayer art in whatever way people wanted to! It was absolutely beautiful by the end of the evening, as people found their voice in art and were left to express their spirituality in whatever way God led them. I was very fortunate to have been placed there. I learned a lot.
- As a young teenager I attended a Methodist Church which was blessed with a coffee bar which was run by volunteers from the community where anyone could just come and offer to help! What a rich variety of folk that openness brought. Again, the invitation not to 'come and see how we do things' but simply to come and offer yourself. It was transformative not just for the individuals but for the community at large, as that church became known as a place where people were free to pray, and chat, and serve coffee just as themselves!

I wonder what Jesus might say to the church of today, which often finds it so difficult to allow people to work, and pray, and serve, and heal, and teach in ways which are different to our own? What challenge might he have for our 'come and see' culture which so often does not connect with people where they are?

Maybe there is that sense of urgency in our own day, just as in Mark's – to listen, to let go, and to allow the Kingdom to be expressed freely, extravagantly, and beautifully. And maybe the things that stand in the way of that...well, ...you know what Jesus says! **Amen.** 

#### **Prayers**

Let us together pray for the breaking in of God's Kingdom...
Our Father, who art in heaven,
hallowed be thy name;
thy kingdom come;
thy will be done;
on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those who trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation;
but deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom,
the power, and the glory
