#### The Beginning of the Galilean Ministry

Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

#### The Rejection of Jesus at Nazareth

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,

because he has anointed me

to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives

and recovery of sight to the blind,

to let the oppressed go free,

to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour'

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing'\*

#### Message.

When the people in the synagogue in Nazareth heard the words that Jesus spoke to them, I wonder what they thought? Jesus would have been recognised from among his own community of Nazareth as someone who was gaining 'celebrity' if you like. As someone who preached and taught in the synagogues round about, word would have spread because of what he was saying. We are told that it was Jesus' custom, his habit, to go to the synagogue on the sabbath day.

Jesus was given the scroll of the prophet Isaiah to read from. We don't know if Jesus chose this passage from Isaiah or if it was the set passage for that day. After standing to read the scripture he then sat down -as was the custom, to explain, discuss, preach about the passage. It is thought that all eyes must have been fixed on him because he missed out a bit of the reading that followed what he read. He said to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour ...... But left out, '...and the day of vengeance of our God'

But if leaving out that key sentence about the Lord's vengeance wasn't a surprise then what Jesus said next certainly was. "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing'.

This scripture from Isaiah is like a manifesto for Jesus a mission statement. He was the promised one spoken about in Isaiah. He had brought in God's Kingdom forever -not just for a year of the Lord's favour, but forevermore. But the manifesto wasn't just for **him** to live out but for all who were there in the synagogue and for all of God's people - for Israel and for everyone outside of the synagogue too -the gentile, the sinner, the enemy. The Lord's favour would be for everyone if they followed the same plan -God's plan.

For the people hearing Jesus speak in the synagogue, maybe their hope, their expectation was for something different. The day of the Lord's vengeance was what many were waiting for. This Jesus was saying and doing things that were beyond their comprehension, but they longed for a freedom brought about by vengeance and not by healing the blind, giving good news to the poor, and

releasing captives. Did they think 'What is that all about?' I imagine very puzzled looks on the faces of those in the synagogue that day.

Is the Good News always what we want to hear? We all have our own agendas, our own manifestos. Good news may come in totally unexpected ways. Do we see things more through our own eyes than God's eyes?

Twenty-five years ago, after many many years of thinking and planning, the church to which Simon and I belonged to then decided to completely re-vamp the interior of the church. So, the old pulpit, communion rail and Dias were taken out -and of course the pews and it was all completely redecorated, carpeted, new chairs bought and new communion furniture installed. One of the things that the church believed would happen as a result of this transformation and upgrade was that new people, hopefully young people, would come flocking to the modernised church and as a result find God.

It didn't happen as they expected, and it took much longer than they expected too. Of course, when the modernisation was first proposed some threatened to leave - how dare we take the pews out! But people didn't leave.

Sadly, at first the church didn't get any new people either. But then because of the new, modern environment preachers and worship leaders and Ministers began to take risks with worship -move the chairs around, sing new songs, make the worship more meaningful and appropriate to the needs of those in the church and outside it.

Some started a Drop-in Prayer Day once a month and new people began to come; Slowly.

Then a new minister was appointed who was LGBTQI+. At first there was concern and people threatened to leave -but they didn't. The appointment of a 'gay' minister attracted those who had been Christian all their lives but had never before been accepted in a church because of their own sexuality. They had struggled to find a place where the reality of the love of God was truly found.

However, those who had found it really difficult to accept the new minister started to talk and listen and befriend the newcomers and real friendships were formed. More people began to come and join because they had heard of the openness of the congregation and the realisation that all were really welcome. It was the genuine love and welcome and acceptance of the stranger that transformed the church and rebuilt it -not the re-modelling and updating of the premises.

Is the challenge every church needs to face today is to ask 'Are *we* really ready to hear God's word? Are we ready to open our heart to hear the good news? Are we ready to weep with repentance but then celebrate and share with joy all that God through his son has done for us? Are we willing to let go of our own manifesto and take hold of the Good News of God's love and acceptance of all?

Many in Jesus' day did not like what he was saying or doing. They did not accept this Good News was for all. They could not accept that they could be wrong about God's plan for them?

Following and accepting Jesus sometimes means that our lives are turned upside down. As churches, the body of Christ, are we ready to be turned around and take risks, go a different direction? If we do Christ goes before us, if we don't....?
