Reading: <u>Luke 15: 1-32</u>

Reflection

Lost-it's a word that can be used in many different ways. I get lost every time I hear Mozart's Ave Verum Corpus, I stop whatever I'm doing, and the world recedes as I become engulfed by the sublime sound. I become lost in music. When I listen to my teenage grandchildren talking it's almost another language, I don't' understand a word that's being said, I am lost. We can be lost geographically, lost in a crowd, or feel lost spiritually, when everything we thought we knew and believed is challenged. We can lose parts of ourselves to sorrow and grief, we can lose ourselves in anger and resentment, we can lose our sense of identity and belonging.

In this passage Jesus tells 3 stories of something lost being found and how that is always a cause for rejoicing. These three parables build on each other, the first two tell of relentless searching until the lost is found and set up the experiences the father and sons will have. Together they are stories of wholeness and completeness. It's not just that there was a lost sheep and a lost coin, the crux of the story is that without them the flock is not complete, the coin was not just a commodity, it was probably part of a dowry; they were essential to the shepherd and the woman. Without them something was missing, something beyond monetary value. Then Jesus tells the third story, but what do we call this third story? The Prodigal Son, the Two Sons, the running father? Who are we in the story? Henri Nouwen wrote "The Return of the Prodigal Son" after studying the Rembrandt painting and he suggests that we are all each of the sons at different points in our lives and that we should aspire to be like the father. He challenges the reader to reflect on their own journey of returning and reconciliation.

We all feel taken for granted and resentful at times, overlooked in favour of those who for whom everything just seems to fall in their lap. The older son feels lost in the everyday, part of the furniture, yet the father leaves the celebrations to tell him just how much he is loved and valued, how essential he is to his father. The father actively pursues him when the son feels lost, just as he runs to greet the returning son. He hitched up his long robes (a sign of wealth and class) and ran, exposing bare legs, What a complete loss of dignity! He could have waited for the son to come to him in repentance and humility, but so great was his love and joy that he ran towards the son who had been lost. Lost in so many ways, by demanding his inheritance the son had lost his status, he became

lost in debauchery, he lost his Jewish identity by making himself unclean, he lost his family. When he hits rock bottom, he returns, not with any hope of restoration but knowing that life as a servant would be preferable to his miserable existence. Sometimes we have to hit rock bottom before acknowledging our need of God.

What do these parables us about God? God is the shepherd; he pursues us to restore us to his flock. God is the woman, relentlessly searching for the small, precious thing that is of such great value to her. God is the father, loving each and everyone of us, never taking us for granted and always running to meet us on the road. Whatever we may have done, whatever we are going through, God runs to clasp us in his loving embrace.
