Reflection

There was a phrase our teacher used to produce on a regular basis whenever someone would complain that another student was verbally bullying them, picking on them. Perhaps you remember it too - 'sticks and stones may break my bones, but names will never hurt me'

I can recall that one of the girls in my class, a timid and withdrawn child whose story none of us ever fully understood was often the target of intimidation – and that as the time went by, she became ever more reclusive as a result. I hope and pray that schools are more alert these days to such dynamics. But I always used to think that the argument that 'names cannot hurt us' was deeply flawed. Our language is powerful, and the reckless or intentionally cruel use of words can be just as damaging as physical assault. I often wonder what happened to the girl in my class – I pray that she was offered support at some stage, and sometimes I wonder if we could have used our own words to influence that situation to the good.

What we say, what we don't say - and how we say it, is important. Throughout our lives we have a responsibility to grow in wisdom in our use of words.

The Old Testament is filled with the stories of those God calls to speak - none of whom seem on the face of things particularly ready for the challenge! Remember Moses, David, Jonah! Today we are reminded of Jeremiah who joins the band of unlikely recruits. Jeremiah believes that God has chosen the wrong one, because he is too young to speak God's word (Perhaps Jeremiah knew my granny, who was fond of telling us that young people should be seen and not heard!)

He is reassured by God not to be afraid - that in whatever he faces God will go with him.

I wonder when you might have heard the call to speak for God, for good, and looked round to see if maybe God meant someone else!

Jesus, having returned to Nazareth has been teaching in the temple and has amazed those around him with his eloquence, warmth and grace. They were excited to be in his presence and to learn from him. That is, until he starts to quote Scripture which reminds them that the goodness and the grace of God is not reserved simply for them (who think themselves worthy recipients). He rehearses in their hearing the stories of those God had blessed who were perceived as outside the 'chosen' – and the atmosphere very quickly changes from warm acceptance to open hostility! Speaking the truth can sometimes get you into trouble.

The good news of God's indiscriminate grace which makes room for all asks much of us who carry that message in our own day;

- To be bold in believing that God can and will use us to share transforming love, if we will only remain open to God's voice. The history of God's engagement with people shows very clearly that nobody is too young or too old to be a messenger of hope!
- To use our words with integrity to be faithful and diligent in our study of Scripture, to try to understand more of the stories we share with others
- And in our everyday living to be careful with our words in small ways as well as in bigger ways. We are called to temper boldness with compassion, and perhaps our own growth in wisdom will lead us to hold other's stories more gently, to pause before we speak (and pray), and to be those who constantly seek God's guiding in sharing the Gospel...
 ...as the Spirit leads us and encourages us to breathe love. Amen.
