BIBLE PASSAGE

Read together the story from Luke 4: 21-30 and then consider the questions below:

- I wonder why the crowd was angry?
- I wonder why Jesus was able to walk through the crowd unhurt?
- I wonder how we let people know that they have hurt us?

Jesus teaches in the synagogue and says some difficult things making people angry.

Drawing game

- Fold a piece of paper in half and then half again – you should have 4 squares
- The first player draws a head on the top square
- Then the next player unfolds the next square and draws the shoulders and torso
- Pass the paper on again and draw the waist and legs
- Pass it on again and then draw the feet

Use your imagination!

Usually, the result is hilarious!

GET CREATIVE!

Make a megaphone

You will need: paper or card, tape, scissors, coloured pens

- On a piece of paper or card (your favourite colour) draw, colour and decorate it. You could use stickers, glitter, pens or draw on things that you want to shout about and share with others such as God's love for us
- When you have finished decorating, shape it into a cone and tape it together so that it does not unravel
- Cut the top and bottom of your megaphone so that the edges are level
- To create a handle, take a small strip of card and fold the edges in
- Tape these edges to the megaphone to create a handle

Envelope Prayers

You will need: a piece of paper (about 10cm square and a pen) and a bowl of water

- Fold all 4 corners of the piece of paper to the centre – it should create 4 envelope flaps
- Open up the 4 flaps and write or draw something that you would like help with this week or you could pray for someone who may need God's help
- Fold the flaps back over to hide your prayer/s
- Next place your envelope with the flaps facing up onto the surface of the water and watch as it opens up
